Our Land Acknowledgment

Horše túuxi! (Hor-sheh troo-hee)

New Museum Los Gatos (NUMU) recognizes that it is located on the ethno-historic tribal territory of the Somontac (so-mon-tahk) / Partacsi (par-tahk-see) / Rictocsi (reehk-tohk-see) Thámien (thah-me-in) Ohlone (ohloh-knee)-dialect-speaking tribal territory of the ancestral unceded tribal lands of the Muwekma Ohlone People whom were missionized in Missions Santa Clara and Santa Cruz. The Los Gatos region also includes the lands of the intermarried Thámiens (thah-me-in), Alsons (all-sohns), and other neighboring tribal groups whom were intermarried with the direct ancestors of some of the lineages enrolled in the Muwekma Ohlone Tribe of the San Francisco Bay Area. Muwékma suyyakma ~ The Muwekma families are the legal successors and living members of the sovereign, historic, Previously Federally Recognized Verona Band of Alameda County, now formally recognized as the Muwekma Ohlone Tribe of the San Francisco Bay Area. In the Chochenyo-Ohlone language, Muwékma (muh-wehk-mah) means La Gente (hen-theh) – The People.

This land was and continues to be of great spiritual significance and historical importance to the Muwekma Ohlone Tribe and other familial descendants of the Verona Band. We recognize that every member of the greater Los Gatos community has, and continues to benefit from the use and occupation of this land, since it was founded in 1887. Consistent with our values of community, inclusion, and diversity, we have a responsibility to acknowledge and make known through various enterprises NUMU's relationship to Native Peoples. As members of the Los Gatos community, it is vitally important that we not only recognize the history of the land on which we live, work, and learn, but also, we recognize that the Muwekma Ohlone People are alive and thriving members of the Los Gatos and broader Bay Area communities today. Aho!

This year, we doubled the participation of Title I schools in *ArtNow*, provided FREE Museum Explorer programs to Title I schools, translated our exhibition (*Un)familiar* into three languages, and introduced Free First Sundays, among other initiatives. RETAZOS: NEW WORKS BY ALEXANDER HERNANDEZ ARTIST IN RESIDENCE

June 3 - October 9, 2022

Alexander Hernandez explores the use of text on his quilts. The words painted onto the fabrics in Alexander's work are lyrics from songs that Hernandez heard his mother listen to as a child. The words about loss and heartbreak ring true and earnest, reminding him of everything his mother was feeling.







MARIE CAMERON CRITICAL MASSES, A VERY LOW TIDE

June 17 - October 23, 2022

Marie Cameron presents views of human impact on our delicate ecosystem, with a series of 9 large-scale paintings that explode with color, dense pattern, and familiar objects colliding with natural elements that remind the viewer of the fragile, causal relationships that affect the fate of our shared ecosystems.

KOONS RUINS AT THE JAMES ESTATE: IN THE ARTIST'S STUDIO FEATURING KATHY AOKI

July 8 - November 27, 2022

Kathy Aoki creates a faux-museum exhibit depicting a fictional character who collects and destroys artwork by Jeff Koons. The immersive satirical tableau, with a mesmeric diorama and new works on paper, brings the viewer in on the joke that reveals the hypocrisy and patriarchy of the art world.

TERRA FIRMA

October 21, 2022 - March 19, 2023

In this group art exhibition guest curated by Marianne K. McGrath, artists explore our relationship with the land and present unique interpretations of meaning and connection through diverse media. Works in the exhibition relate to the physical and poetic features of land and introduce relevant subthemes such as stewardship, social justice, place, identity, and migration.

RECLAMATION: RESILIENCE OF THE MUWEKMA OHLONE TRIBE

November 4, 2022 - May 21, 2023

This art exhibition about the vitality of the Muwekma features photography of tribal members by Tribal Photographer Kike Arnal and promotes a deeper understanding of local indigenous art, culture, history, and contemporary issues in Los Gatos and the greater Bay Area, and preserves and shares knowledge about critical issues of federal recognition.

RECLAMATION: ABORIGINAL ANCESTRAL HOMELAND OF THE MUWEKMA OHLONE TRIBE

December 9, 2022 - April 23, 2023

Visitors to this exhibition can explore places of significance to the Muwekma Ohlone Tribe and the Mosaic Atlas Cultural Mapping Project, an interactive map.

IN THE ARTISTS' STUDIO: FEATURING RREVV STUDIO

May 5 - September 3, 2023

Meet the artists behind the Santa Cruzbased design studio RREVV, Rachel and Rigel Hunter, and dive into their shared creative process to develop and execute new works by following along with a piece of unique artwork as it goes from concept to raw material, to a collectible object.

(UN)FAMILIAR

June 2 - November 5, 2023





ARTNOW 2023: UNARMED TRUTH ANNUAL SANTA CLARA COUNTY JURIED HIGH SCHOOL EXHIBITION

12th Annual I May 20 - June 25, 2023

What can your art reveal about the truth? Art can transform, empower, and bring us together. It gives space to actively listen and to speak freely without minimizing the perspectives of others. Truth can hurt, heal, and make way for genuine self-expression. NUMU invites Santa Clara County high school students to create an original work of art that reveals a personal or universal truth, finding inspiration from leaders and social movements that have helped us understand, embody, or uphold a hidden truth as a community and reflecting on their own experiences.

WHAT IS ARTNOW?

ArtNow is an annual juried Santa Clara County high school art exhibition and educational program, presented by NUMU. ArtNow offers opportunities for high school student artists, from Palo Alto to Gilroy, to gain real-world experience in participating in a juried museum exhibition. Each year, a new theme is chosen for





the exhibition and students are asked to submit a work of art based on that theme. \$16,000 in scholarships and awards are given to participating students. Students have the opportunity to win awards in 8 artistic categories (Painting, Drawing, Mixed Media, Printmaking, Sculpture, Photography, Digital Art, and Video/Animation) as well as an overall Best in Show prize and a People's Choice award.

TEEN COUNCIL

In 2022, we launched the *ArtNow* Teen Council: a group of high school interns who are helping to elevate the *ArtNow* program to be more widely accessible and more relevant to teenagers living across Santa Clara County. Through establishing the ArtNow Teen Council, NUMU hopes to build a stronger partnership with student artists so that they aren't just the recipients of the ArtNow program, but the architects.

The Permanent Collections

THE LOS GATOS HISTORY PROJECT

The Los Gatos History Project (LGHP) was launched September 2020. The goal of the project is to tell untold stories of Los Gatos and surrounding communities through an exploration of NUMU's permanent art and history collections. This program was launched due in part to significant funding received from the County of Santa Clara's History Grant Program and it will continue to be funded through 2025 by a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services, and a generous bequest from Leonard Pacheco and Diane Roberts.

DIGITAL COLLECTIONS DATABASE

Over the course of the past year, the team has made significant strides. The museum has an estimated 3,000+ artworks, historical artifacts, and ephemera in its permanent collections. This past year, we have been

diligently photographing, researching, and rehousing items from our collection, uploading each record to **CatalogIt**, NUMU's first working digital catalog and collections inventory.

ACQUISITIONS

NUMU collects works of art and historical artifacts that engage and expand interest in the art & history of the Bay Area, with a special focus on Los Gatos. We hold, in the public trust, these materials of cultural importance to preserve, research, and present them to the public for education and enjoyment. Currently, our collections team is working to complete a comprehensive inventory of the permanent collection's current holdings and is not accepting unsolicited object donations. However, during the course of this year, we were able to accession (formally accept into the permanent collection) the 22 photographs by Kike Arnal that were featured in both Reclamation exhibitions, the unique silkscreen created by Alexander Hernandez as part of the Director's Circle program, and the guilted letters Hernandez designed to title his exhibition Retazos.



ASPIRING ARTISTS FOOTBRIDGE MURAL PROJECT


Since the 1990s Los Gatos youth have painted panels for the Forbes Mill Footbridge. Every summer, NUMU works with young artists to learn about Los Gatos History, visit local landmarks, and create artwork that captures "Life in Los Gatos." These artworks are digitally reproduced and installed as a mural on the footbridge for the entire community to enjoy. This past year, this long running program received an Award of Excellence from California Park and Recreation Society (CPRS). This project is made possible by Los Gatos-Saratoga Recreation and the Town of Los Gatos in partnership with New Museum Los Gatos and the Arts and Culture Commission.

MUSEUM EXPLORER

With support from the Valley Foundation, NUMU has reimagined our long-running field trip program. The museum was able to develop new curricula and programming elements. Museum Explorer invites students to explore art and history either in the classroom or with a museum visit.

Diversity, Equity, Accessibility & Inclusion

NUMU recognizes the need to be proactively antiracist, accessible to all, and relevant to the regions we serve. With NUMU's strategic vision to be more civically and community-focused, we host exhibits and programs that are responsive to our communities, both within Los Gatos and throughout the Bay Area, advocating for those traditionally left out of art and historical discourse. We challenge ourselves to uplift marginalized voices in exhibits and prioritize programs for under-resourced communities. We partner with artists, organizations, and civic bodies to make art and history come alive for our constituents—in Los Gatos and beyond.

GOAL 1: Expand the reach of our youth programs such as Museum Explorer for K-5 students, and *ArtNow*, our annual juried high school art exhibition, to ensure equitable opportunities for participation throughout Santa Clara County.

GOAL 2: Co-create art and history exhibitions with a wide array of diverse community input (such as paid artists, guest curators, and artists-in-residence), ensuring democratization of the NUMU institutional voice. Ensure more balanced representation of underrecognized histories, BIPOC, LGBTQ, people with disabilities, and women in our exhibitions.

GOAL 3: Update our website, programs, and physical space to be more physically, cognitively, and financially accessible to reduce barriers to engagement.

GOAL 4: Provide a work culture that attracts diverse talent and is equitable and sustainable by offering benefits and livable salaries, as well as reasonable work hours and paid time off. Remove harmful and/or exclusive practices and policies by Interrogating our internal staff work practices, and updating our staff handbook.

GOAL 5: Reduce barriers to board membership by being genuinely flexible with board dues (i.e. an in-kind contribution

option) and nurturing an atmosphere of inclusion for members of all backgrounds, ages, and careers. Make intentional efforts to recruit board members of diverse backgrounds to reflect the diversity of the entire Bay Area. Remove harmful and/or exclusive practices and policies by Interrogating our internal board practices, and updating our board bylaws.

GOAL 6: Create a safe space for the Los Gatos community and the wider Bay Area to learn about equity, inclusion, and antiracism through arts and history exhibitions and programs.

OPEN TO ALL


NUMU has joined two nationwide access programs, Museums for All and Blue Star Museums. Museums for All is a way to reach out to underserved communities by offering free admission to low-income households. Blue Star Museums supports free admission to the nation's active duty military personnel and their families, including National Guard and Reserve. NUMU is constantly updating to make sure that the museum's physical and virtual spaces are accessible to everyone.
